# **Objectives**

As a part of viewing the exhibition and completing the activities in this Education kit, students will:

- Gain an understanding about how artists use art to express ideas and communicate with their audience.
- Develop the ability to interpret concepts and symbols in art and make conclusions about the artist's intentions.
- Identify that artists use a variety of materials and disciplines to convey a variety of messages.
- Discuss and respond to art in a variety of forms.
- Gain a greater knowledge of how art can be a powerful form of documentation and critique of the social, economic, environmental and political context in which it is made.
- Consider the relationship that exists between the artwork, artist, gallery and audience.
- Form an appreciation for the very deep connections contemporary artists have with place as represented in their practice.

# About the exhibition

Sidney McMahon works across sculptural installation, video and performance. They use a variety of materials, textures and colours in their work.

### 'Of hope and longing'

This exhibition is a series of digital performances streamed on social media, as well as works inside the gallery. A poem by McMahon lines the gallery walls in a series of drawings, each drawing individual but at the same time working together to represent a collective idea. The digital performances will draw on McMahon's personal connections between queerness and county music. McMahon appropriates the aesthetics and materiality of country music to unpack the growth, stoicism, longing and hope that this industry nurtured throughout their childhood in rural Queensland.

These works are based on a poem McMahon wrote while on residency in Collector just 20 minutes from Goulburn! Each work is drawn from a line of the poem, each line referencing to something specific - hope, identity, making Stetson cowboy hats, longing, desire, vulnerability, responsibility, stoicism, disguises.

# What is Video Art?

Video Art emerged in the late 1960's as video tape recorders and video technology became available and affordable.

Video Art uses visual and audio as a medium. It may incorporate performers, recorded images, sounds, television sets, dialogue. It can be broadcast in galleries, museums, streamed online, distributed as a DVD.

# Identity



# **Photosynthesis**

## What is photosynthesis?


Did you know that plants can make their own food? It's called Photosynthesis. Photosynthesis is a process where plants use light from the sun to convert carbon dioxide from the air and water from the soil into sugar to feed the plant and oxygen is given out in the air.

## **Colours**

Colour is a big part of some artists works.

#### Colour and emotion

Colours can make us feel a particular way by evoking different emotions. Not everyone associates the same emotions to the same colours. There are a few factors that influence our thinking - psychological effects, biological conditioning and cultural imprinting - in other words, past experiences or cultural differences.

#### For example -

The colour black - for some it is powerful, mysterious but for others it is scary.

The colour blue - for some it is calming, friendly but for others it is cold.

The colour yellow - for some it is happy, but for others it is overwhelming.

The colour red - for some it is energising but for others it is danger, anger.

Colour the circle a colour that makes you feel happy.




