The Wayfarer, the artist, Ray Monde



Ray Monde grew up in Burrell Creek, a dairy region in Australia He worked in advertising as a creative in London, New York and Sydney. In 2012, he moved to the small rural town of Braidwood to work as an artist full-time. In 2020, Ray relocated to Seattle to set up his practice in the Good Arts Building on Cherry Street, Pioneer Square.

Monde is primarily paper artist. He over paints glossy magazines with a thin wash of synthetic polymer paint. This lets the printed images and words to ghost through the paint, adding an extra dimension to his works. By tearing up these pages, Monde invents a palette to create his heavily textured works on canvas and paper.

In 2018 Monde was part of group show, *Coarse Stories* at Goulburn Regional Art Gallery, his first institution show.

Monde's work is in private collections in Australia, United States of America, United Kingdom and United Arab Emirates.

The Wayfarer's route





A vignette is a brief description of an event or episode. Ray Monde made over 100 collage vignettes documenting moments from his journey which began in Goulburn on Thursday 11 March and ended in Braidwood on Tuesday 16 March.

Day 1

Thursday 11 March Goulburn – Pelican Station

Distance 9.4 kilometres; 1 hour, 55 minutes

About Pelican Station

Pelican Station is a farm operated by the Sykes family who have been in the Goulburn district since 1827. The station has up to 5000 sheep and 50 head of Angus cattle and also operates as an accommodation and event venue.

Shortly after leaving Goulburn, Ray Monde was met with a big thunderstorm. As a result Monde got very wet and was put hours behind schedule, spending the evening unexpectedly at Tirrana Public School! Friday 12 March Pelican Station – Springfield

Distance 9.4 kilometres; 1 hour, 54 minutes

About Springfield

Springfield Station was established by William Pitt Faithfull in 1828. The main residence at Springfield was built in 1857 and known as the 'Big House'. The estate is now owned and managed by Robert and Anna Adamson.



Native animals

About Tarago and the Loaded Dog Hotel

Lake Bathurst and Tarago are close by and were originally supposed to be named the other way around! It was a misprint on the map for the new rail line that had them swapped to what they are today.

The road used to be the only road to the Queanbeyan/Canberra valley. The Lake Bathurst Hotel (now known as the Loaded Dog Hotel) was a busy place and has lots of stories to tell about Bushranger activity in the area. The name the Loaded Dog comes from a story by Henry Lawson.

The signature

Ray Monde started signing his works with a crown and a small orb above it called a 'monde', French for world. His signature is now a paper crown flipped upside down, forming the letter 'm' for 'Monde' and representing the idea of creating from nothing rather than inheriting status.


Sunday 14 March Tarago - Reedy Creek

The toll

About Braidwood

Braidwood was founded in 1822 on the land of the Yuin Nation. It experienced rapid population growth in the 1850s due to gold mining in the area, before declining. Braidwood was the first town listed on the New South Wales state heritage register in 2007.

Collage

Following a career in advertising Ray Monde's art practice involves painting, cutting and pasting papers from magazines. Use your knowledge and friend Google to answer the following questions about collage.

The word 'collage' comes from the French word 'coller'. What does 'coller' mean in French?

Collage was made famous by two cubist artists. What are their names?

Other than paper, what else can an artist use their collage?

On a separate piece of paper, use collage to create an image of a landscape.

The big works

Following his journey, Ray Monde took some time to ponder his experiences and revisit his vignettes. This period of reflection resulted in a series of larger works on canvas.

Homer's Odyssey

Ray Monde had spent many months away, isolated due to the border closures of 2020—21. When he was finally able to make the long journey home from America he felt something akin to the ancient Greek writer Homer's protagonist Odysseus.

The ancient Greek story *The Odyssey* by Homer, details the 20 year long journey the hero Odysseus took home following the Trojan War. It was a difficult journey impacted by various hurdles, detours and monsters.

In the Strait of Messina Odysseus and his crew encountered the very dangerous sea monster Scylla. She was said to have

- 12 feet
- six heads on long snaky necks
- each head having a triple row of sharklike teeth
- From her middle sprouted the heads of baying dogs

In the space provided below, draw your representation of Scylla.

Feeling exposed

Ray Monde has illustrated himself nude a number of times in this series. Monde said that on one hand he felt very content walking in the landscape, but when confronted with people he didn't know, he started to feel quite vulnerable. He wasn't sure how much of his identity to share with strangers as he couldn't be sure what they would say or how they might react.

The lotus eaters

There are many references to the lotus eaters in Ray Monde's works. The lotus eaters are a group of people featured in Homer's *The Odyssey*. They occupied a small island and only had interest in eating lotus flowers. When Odysseus's men ate the lotus flower they became extremely happy and lost all interest in returning home. Ray Monde said he experienced that sense of happy aimlessness many times on his journey.

Ray Monde describes his works of art as emotional landscapes as they embody a personal narrative of how it felt to be in that space.
