About the Art Trail and Collection in focus.

This Art Trail has been developed for Collection in Focus.

This resource includes practical and theoretical activities for all ages and can be used before and after visiting the Gallery.

Collection in focus explores over 40 years of Goulburn Regional Art Gallery's permanent collection. Art Galleries add works to their collection over time, this process is called an acquisition. Once an art gallery acquires an artwork it is then responsible for showcasing the artwork and keeping the artwork safe. Sometimes art galleries also receive artworks as gifts and donations. Permanent collections are very important, they help to document the history of an art gallery and its region over time, and bring exciting and valuable cultural pieces to the local area that the art gallery represents.








